This spring, we cast our votes in the election for candidates from the highest levels of state government to the local leaders who make our city run. The results brought many changes, so read further to see the updated list of the elected officials who represent Arbor Hills. One election that's important to our neighborhood is for the District 10 Alder. The role of our Alder is to advocate for our district, communicate with constituents, and serve on committees that make decisions affecting residents. They have an important and direct impact on what happens in our neighborhood.

as the District 10 Alder and has served in that role since the districts shifted last year. She has been an active advocate for our neighborhood and a friendly face at our events. On behalf of the AHNA Board, I'd like to congratulate Alder Figueroa Cole. We look forward to working together to serve the needs of our community!

The Board would also like to thank former Alder Sheri Carter for her many years of service to the neighborhood. Sheri has been a lifelong resident of Arbor Hills since her parents moved here in 1987. She served on the AHNA board for over a decade, from 2003-2014, including as President. During that time, she was instrumental in the redevelopment of the frontage road as the Arbor Gate complex was built, she collaborated on the creation of the first open school house program in the city at Leopold, and she advocated for the Cannonball bike path that many of us use today to stroll, run, or bike. Sheri went on to serve as an Alder starting in 2015, where she continued

to advocate for the expansion of Cannonball bike path. I asked her what she was most proud of during her tenure as Alder, and she said "Serving the district's residents in the manner they deserve, working on the Landmark Oaks development, seeing the creation of a new school in the district, and creating a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district that will total \$225 million in investments over the next 10 years." She also reassured me that she isn't done yet. She plans to continue her work as a public servant. Thank you, Sheri, for all that you've done for Arbor Hills!

# **SOME GARDENING THOUGHTS**

Do you lose sleep worrying whether you are the best possible steward of Mother Earth? Or is your main concern growing a perfectly manicured grassy lawn with well placed ornamental flowers, shrubs and trees? Most of us fall somewhere in between, hoping our gardening choices benefit both nature and neighborhood beautification. And some of us just like being outdoors getting our hands dirty and cultivating neighborly friendships.

However, we are facing a worldwide habitat loss, a huge decline in insects and birds and a changing climate. Supporting wildlife is an urgent need as more and more land is taken for urban use, high production farming, solar and wind farms and energy transmission infrastructure. What can we do? Here are a few strategies to consider:

1. Learn as much as you can about your own micro-climate, your soil, your sunny and shady areas and plants that will grow best.

2. Choose native trees like oaks which sustain several hundred species rather than, for example, my personal favorite, a ginkgo, which though hardy, benefits very few.

3. Plant native shrubs such as dogwood, hazelnut and serviceberry, and native perennials such as bee balm, aster, goldenrod, and milkweed, etc.

4. Provide nesting materials for birds, bird feeders and birdbaths and leave fallen leaves and debris for overwintering insects.

5. Install bat houses and bee nesting boxes.

6. Limit or discontinue the use of pesticides.

7. Cut back on lawn maintenance or reestablish some or all of it as close as possible to native prairie with pollinator plants for every season.

8. Accept minor insect damage on your veggies and ornamentals. 9. Keep lighting to a minimum. Our birds and beasts are already disoriented and confused by city lights, and lights shining beyond your borders diminishes your neighbor's enjoyment of the night skies.

10. That rotten tree or trunk in your backyard? If it is not a safety hazard, keep it. It may be supporting an entire village of tiny critters who in turn provide tasty protein for birds.

Let's do what we can to help our neighborhood to be a haven for wildlife!




# **CALL FOR NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT IDEAS!**

# **GOOD NEIGHBORS ARE ESSENTIAL**

Great things are happening right under our noses in Arbor Hills! I just had the good fortune of visiting the Good Neighbors Personal Essentials Pantry, operating out of the Arbor Covenant Church building at 2509 McDivitt Road. The pantry, sponsored by a coalition of three churches, provides essential items that are not covered by food stamps to people in need in the Arbor Hills/ Leopold area and beyond. Essential items include toiletry and household items like diapers, deodorant, laundry soap, etc.

The pantry takes place every Friday from 10am to 12 noon, and the 3rd Thursday of the month from 5:30 to 7pm. It serves 30 to 40 families at a session. With no overhead and an all volunteer staff, it is able to operate on a budget of \$28,000 to \$30,000 a year. Most products are bought from Certco, a local grocery supplier.

Some are donated by individuals and groups. Want to know how you can help? The pantry is in need of donations, with money being the biggest need, as staff can buy about 3 times as much from Certco as can be bought for the same amount of money retail. They are also in need of volunteers; to welcome guests, to fill orders, and to provide computer assistance. You can go to their website at GNPEP.net to read more about what they do and how they do it, and to sign up for volunteer shifts and/or make a donation. The pantry has been operating for about 10 years, and is a prime example of what being good neighbors is all about!! Check it out!
