ALDER CANDIDATE Q & A: MADISON CITY COUNCIL DISTRICT 10

The 2023 Wisconsin Spring Election is scheduled to be held on April 4, 2023. One seat on the Wisconsin Supreme Court is scheduled to appear on the ballot, as well as several other nonpartisan local and judicial elections including the District 10 Alder election.

Below are the responses to the Arbor Hills Neighborhood Association Alder Candidate questionnaire.

What are the most important issues facing District 10 and the Arbor Hills community?

Sheri Carter

Currently the most pressing issues in the city, District 10 and Arbor Hills are reduction in violent incidents, public safety, homelessness, eviction prevention, affordable housing options, the preservation of historical sites, public transit, challenging fiscal budget in 2024 and beyond, and accessible mental health services. In addition to the concerns mentioned previously, Arbor Hills collaboration with the city parks department and the Arboretum to preserve our nature habitat that surrounds the neighborhood. Maintaining a close relationship with both Leopold neighborhood and the Fitchburg alder representing the bordering neighborhood is key as is maintaining the elements that make this community one the best neighborhood in Madison. Arbor Hills neighbors have always been willing to come to the table to discuss any issues. I am confident that any challenges in the coming years will be faced together.

Yannette Figueroa Cole

District 10 is not immune to distracted or reckless drivers; we each play a role in solving this issue, and the solutions involve a balancing act between infrastructural changes and enforcement. We also have disparities in housing security and safe living conditions for our residents, and we need access to youth and family-oriented activities.

All integrations bring challenges and stress; the welcoming of the Town of Madison to the Arbor Hills area is no different and will require a continuous partnership between the city, alder, association, and residents to ensure services are accessible and efficiently delivered.

What would be your top priority for the next 2 years if elected?

Sheri Carter

My priorities will be to support and/or expand the following: homeless services and the men's purpose-built shelter, eviction prevention, public safety accountability, equitable transit services, neighborhood improvement and services, small businesses, entrepreneurship through the city's commercial ownership assistance program and small business emergency recovery program, and more.

Yannette Figueroa Cole

I am running for re-election because I kept my promise of focusing on public safety from the lens of health by prioritizing public transportation, mental health,

and housing security, as well as fostering intentional partnerships with community organizations, city staff, alders, and Dane county supervisors. I remain committed to the Violence Prevention Plan implementation, street infrastructure changes to reduce speeding and fatalities, and supporting CARES. As well as improving safety conditions of the unsheltered population, expanding activities for the community to enjoy the use of parks, building community, strengthening relationships, economic development, and continuing to streamline ordinances to help increase public participation and transparency.

What are the kind of problems or barriers vou hope your constituents understand they can bring to your attention?

Sheri Carter

One of the most important things an alder can do for their district residents is to communicate effectively and frequently. I have proven that this can be done so that all voices feel valued and treated fairly. We may not all agree on the city process and projects, however, at the end of the day I will have a clear understanding of the district and/or neighborhood stand on the process or project, and in turn I am able to communicate their views to either city staff, developer, community organization and/or in the chambers. I want my constituents to feel at ease to contact me about the problems/barriers that are impacting their lives now. This could be traffic issues, safety, snow plow, welfare check, etc. It is important to me to be able to resolve the issue or direct the constituent to the appropriate city staff and followup with the constituent to see if the resolution was satisfactory.

Yannette Figueroa Cole

For the past two years, I have facilitated a range of supporting services such as the leaf, recycling, and refuse collection. As soon as the association brought attention to the issue, I facilitated the road resurfacing needs in the area. I worked directly with staff, volunteered, and promoted Parks Alive to bring access to safe and healthy activities to the neighborhood as per the request of residents. I worked with building inspection to support tenants and improve their living conditions. I have provided learning opportunities to navigate the city's website and project process.

Thus far, I have been able to find the answers to all the questions received by mail, text, or phone call. When the request is outside the city's jurisdiction, thanks to the partnerships I have established, I have facilitated direct connections with people from agencies outside city administration.

In a nutshell, I want people to know that I respond to emails and texts, answer my phone and set aside time to create my weekly blog entry where I share information about things that directly impact the district.















BETTER KNOW A NEIGHBOR: ANGIE OLER

Angie Oler is a Research Specialist with the Department of Medicine here at the UW. But as our conversation flowed from parenting to community building to social justice work, it was clear that instead of just making a living, Angie has made sure to make a life.

Although we may not all have had the joy of meeting Angie Oler (yet, but she's working on that), simply driving by her home on Kingston Drive gives you a glimpse into her cheerful enjoyment of life. The volleyball court, the hockey rink, the fire pit and all the other obvious signs of an inviting and fun-filled household beckon those walking by to stop and say "hello!" That inviting exterior is intentional, and is just one one of the ways Angie builds community with all around her.

Angie and her husband Chad moved to Arbor Hills in 2005. Like many residents, Angie was drawn in by the great trees, access to the Arboretum and the feeling of being in the country while in the heart of the city; the character of the houses give the neighborhood a distinct sense of place. Even now, as Angie walks around the neighborhood, she delights in always finding a new grape vine or rain garden to survey with her

But Angie and her husband were not the type to simply sit back and enjoy the view without doing something to help make the neighborhood more enjoyable for all. Not long after

moving in, they set up a volleyball court and distributed flyers to invite neighbors over for pick up games. Later, as their own children (now 11 and 14) began to join in the festivities, they built a hockey rink for all to enjoy lit by cheerful lights that brighten the long winter nights.

The invisible thread that seemed to connect all of Angie's stories was the desire to build community. As the orbit of her children started to extend past their own inviting yard and into Leopold Elementary, Angie's desire to build community followed them there and she became an active member of the Leopold Elementary Parent Faculty Organization.

In 2020, as COVID took its toll, Angie looked around and saw how the hardships of COVID were not affecting all our neighbors in the same way and set out to help. What started as Angie's daughter auctioning off her artwork to raise funds for food, grew into the Leopold Elementary Parent Faculty Organization Social Justice

Angie identified a need and created a sustainable structure for help. The beauty of Angie's work with

Leopold Elementary lies not just in her ability to align needs with motivated volunteers, but to create systems of kindness that will outlast her time as an active volunteer. As her children move on to Cherokee Middle School and West High School, Angie's legacy at Leopold Elementary lives on. New parents can now take up the mantle of Angie's work, and continue to make the neighborhoods surrounding Leopold, including Arbor Hills, more equitable and just places for all. Neighbors like Angie are what makes Arbor Hills such an amazing place to

This summer, as we continue to inch closer to normalcy, a mainstay of the Kingston Drive social scene is returning once again. For the first time since 2019, the Olers will be hosting their pickup volleyball games. So if you happen to be walking along Kingston Drive on a warm summer night and see a pickup game in progress, make sure to stop and say hello! INTRODUCING THE ARBOR HILLS GARDENING COMMITTEE


