



Lake Wingra Watershed Conservation

Across the beltline is the Arboretum we all know and love and, with it, the beautiful Lake Wingra. This aquatic fixture of the community is at the center of an important conservation and improvement project currently underway thanks to a grant award between the UW-Madison Arboretum's and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Lake Wingra is of critical importance to the Arboretum as the vast majority of the reserve drains into the body of water.

The project is focused on reducing the harmful effect of stormwater that flows from the city, which can corrupt the lake. While detention ponds and restored land help to filter and absorb some of the stormwater from surrounding neighborhoods, collective help is needed to ensure the health of the watershed. This project will provide a model for community engagement in pressing environmental issues and document how neighborhood-focused efforts can make a difference.

As part of this effort, the Dudgeon Monroe Neighborhood Association (DMNA) received a subgrant. The DMNA Water Quality Team who is overseeing grant activities invites you to a gathering in Vilas Park, Saturday, May 21st from 1:00pm to 4:00pm.



The event is family-friendly and free. More than 25 organizations committed to clean water will be in attendance as well as neighbors from across the city of Madison. Come out and:

- Participate in fun activities involving Lake Wingra and its surroundings.
- ☐ Engage with storyteller Andi Cloud, a member of the Ho-Chunk Nation.
- ☐ Renew a sense of connection among people, land, and water.
- ☐ Meet homeowners with rain gardens, rain barrels, or with prairies instead of lawns as ways to keep water out of their basements.
- ☐ Talk with neighbors who plant prairies and greenspaces on public property.
- ☐ Talk with urban vegetable gardeners.
- ☐ Learn how climate change impacts Madison Lakes and ways to lessen effects.
- $\ \square$ Learn about water management including ways to address flooding.
- ☐ Experience lake monitoring and tracking harmful chloride.
- ☐ Enjoy art inspired by water research results

The DMNA Water Quality Team and its partners also installed two 1600 square feet of rain gardens in the Wingra School Dudgeon Monroe Park. Partners included Wingra School, City of Madison City Engineering, and Wisconsin Environmental Initiatives (WEI). Volunteers from several different organizations and neighborhoods finished planting the 1200 prairie plants in September. The deep rooted prairie plants filter and retain polluted stormwater from the site which otherwise would find its way to nearby Lake Wingra.



Our New Alder

I am Yannette Figueroa Cole, Alder for District 10. Every 10 years and based on the census population counts the districts are reassessed. This year, changes also impacted District 10. The current area includes the following neighborhoods:

- Arbor Hills Dunn's Marsh
- Dunn's Marsh Allied Orchard Ridge
 - Meadowood Summit Woods
- · Crawford, Marlborough & Nakoma

District 10 covers school attendance areas for West & Memorial and is under the service areas of West, South & Midtown MPD Districts. I am excited to continue to learn about the Arbor Hills community, their strengths and the areas of needs and support.

About me, I moved to Madison from Puerto Rico in 1991 and I have lived in the Dunn's Marsh area for over 25 years. I served the neighborhood association in various roles and have strong ties with the Allied Neighborhood Association and the area's NRT. At work I am System Admin and my skill set is focused on analytics, process mapping, and collaboration. For years, being an advocate for people experiencing houselessness, and volunteering with organizations that serve this community have given me a sense of purpose.

It has been an honor serving District 10 and the city during times of great adversity and despair, the pandemic has lifted the vail of poverty and inequalities all around us which has been infused by race and exclusion.

COVID-19 has reaffirmed the health disparities of those living in poverty, working families, and marginalized communities continue to experience. The isolation has taken a toll on our mental health and well-being; none of us is immune from dealing with a mental health crisis call. That is why

my priority have been health! A healthy community is a safe community! As a district and as a city, when we lift those in dire need, we all reap the benefits for healthier and safer neighborhoods.

COVID-19 continues to impact housing security putting more and more people at risk across the district. Multiple rounds of Federal funding have already been distributed to maintain people housed and to support shelter operations as well as the unsheltered population.

Only when people's basic needs are met, and when people's well-being is secured can we interrupt the cycle of violence. I am eager to represent our district in discussions about public safety and violence prevention. I will continue to collaborate with the City and County to implement the Madison & Dane Health Violence Prevention Plan and to see it grow and develop into solutions that make us healthier and safer.

Other areas of focus have been transit, where the city is committed to make streets safer and inclusive for all not just for vehicles. Currently, Metro is revamping the current routes design, this exercise last took place in the late 1990's. Vision Zero has multiple projects impacting the district too, zero death in our streets is a pledge we should all stand by.

For the Arbor Hills area, I am currently focused on the Town of Madison transition into the city of Madison. Welcoming our new residents and ensuring they get the services they need to thrive in our city.



New Public Art Sculpture Series in the Arboretum this Spring!

Beginning in April of 2022, the Madison Public Art Project and the Arboretum will be unveiling a year long sculpture series for the public to enjoy.

Running for one year, until April 2023, "Canopy Understories" brings skilled artists together to share their talents with the broader Madison community.

Talented Madison-based artists, Laura Richards and William Grant Turnbull, both UW graduates, are inspired by nature and will be the primary artists driving the exhibition. They illuminate how the tools and technology of the modern world can be more sustainable.

Two sculptures at the center of the program are Mayapple Canopy & Samara Flight:

The Mayapple Canopy sculpture takes a larger-than-life look at the Mayapple, a species native to Wisconsin. The sculpture will function during the day as a shade canopy, its shadow tracing a large arc on the ground like a sundial. It also stores energy from the sun, like photosynthesis in living plants. But instead of using that energy for plant growth and reproduction, it will power the LED-illuminated, blown glass fruit after sunset.

The samara leaf brings beauty to Wisconsin.

To support this project, and others like it, the Madison Public Art Project is currently seeking donations to continue to serve the Madison community.







Arbor Hills Holiday Lights Winner!

The Samara Flight is a linear mobile depicts the winged seed pods, (or samaras) of Wisconsin's state tree, the sugar maple. Sculpted in lightweight materials used by the aviation industry and held aloft by a metallic cable and hardware, this trio of wind-activated kinetic sculptures will mimic the natural dispersal mechanism maple trees use. The installation seeks to question how the things people build can be made more efficiently, sustainably, and with more grace and style.
