ullet TOWN & CITY OF MADISON MERGER UPDATE ullet

After a 19-year process, on Oct 31st, 2022, the merging of the Town of Madison into the City of Madison and Fitchburg will be completed.

Why The Merger?

Prior to 2003, the Town of Madison was subject to some annexations of its territory by the City of Madison and Fitchburg as both entities were rapidly expanding. The burdensome legal battles and continued anticipated growth clearly demonstrated the need for the three entities to come to the table and put together a plan for the future. That plan, The Final Attachment, is a phased twenty-year elimination of the Town of Madison and the absorption of her remaining components into the City of Madison and the City of Fitchburg.

Is Arbor Hills Affected?

Yes. A section in the north-west of the neighborhood, as well as some adjacent regions are still in the Town of Madison and will be transitioning to the City in the coming year.

What Happens Next?

On Oct 20th, from 6-7pm, the City will be holding a final virtual Public Information Meeting to answer questions and provide information on the following topics:

- Impact of Resident's Property Taxes
- · November 2022 Elections
- Transportation System Changes
- · Change Of Address Process
- · Park and Public Library Updates

Residents are strongly encouraged to attend if they have questions on the above or are wishing to learn more about how the City is handling these shifts for former Town of Madison citizens.

EXPERTS AMONG US:

LT. HARRIS - SOUTH DISTRICT By Michael Horecki

Being at the scene of an incident that requires giving statements to the police can be stressful and isn't something many of us think about until it happens to us. In the moment, questions can start to run through our heads - "What would be most helpful?" "Is there a right way to do this?"

For this edition of Experts Among Us, we sat down with South District Patrol Lieutenant, Justine Harris to get some advice on the best way to navigate giving helpful statements to the police.

Before we dive in Lt. Harris, tell us a bit about yourself how did you end up working in the South District of Madison?

This is actually the second time I've worked in the South District during my career at the Madison Police Department. When I was first promoted to the position of Detective, I was fortunate to serve in this district. It was a great place to learn due to some talented senior detectives and the variety of cases that get

Now, as a new lieutenant, I am once again lucky enough to be placed South. I am very excited by the many community engagement opportunities the South District offers, the diversity of its population and the history of community involvement from the citizens of the South District neighborhoods.

What advice do you have for folks giving statements? Are there pieces of information that are more helpful than others?

When citizens witness or are victims of a crime, stress and adrenaline often kick in. It is sometimes hard to know what the right thing to say or do is. The first thing to think about is safety. Are you or anybody else injured? Is there an ongoing threat? Does somebody have a weapon?

If the answer to those questions is no, it allows everybody to calm down a little bit. If we (the police) know there's no one in immediate danger, it reduces our stress and allows us to respond quickly, but without the same sense of critical urgency. We might have some cars check the area for the suspect(s), while the main officer assigned makes contact at the scene of the crime to gather all the

The most helpful details you can provide include what the suspect looked like, what gender and approximate age you believed them to be, what they were wearing, how they left the scene (car, on foot, bicycle) and what direction they were going. It's ok if you don't feel comfortable giving specifics. Information like, "they had long brown hair," or "they looked about high-school age," and "their skin was lighter than mine," are all helpful details. Anything unique about the suspect or their clothing, like tattoos, scars, clothing logos or unique shoes is also helpful information when we're trying to identify suspects in the field.

What mistakes do folks make that our readers should keep in mind?

There are two common issues I often see with witness or victim statements.

- · Not being comfortable saying you just don't know something. Most of us want to be helpful. If we're asked a question, we want to try and provide an answer. If our minds don't have an answer to a question, they will often start trying to create one. This can lead to inaccurate descriptions and details. This is why the same suspect will often be described in vastly different ways and wearing various color clothing. However, if you think you remember something, but you aren't sure. It's still good to tell us, just let us know you aren't certain. Telling us, "I think he had bright green tennis shoes on, but I'm not certain," gives us something to go on but doesn't lock us into that description.
- · Processing the incident with others before giving a statement. "Did you see

unusual and dramatic happens. However, when giving a statement to police, it's important to be aware of what you know from your own senses vs. what another witness may have told you. Do you know the suspect had a knife because you saw it or because your neighbor said the suspect had one in his hands when he ran by? It's ok to tell police what someone else told vou. In fact, it can be very helpful in pointing us in the direction of people who have more or different details. However, it's important that we know which portions of your statement are based on your direct observations vs. second-hand knowledge. This is one of the reasons officers may separate groups of people and interview each person separately.

Is there anything else our readers should know on the topic?

Sometimes people think of something a day or more after the incident or they think they recognize the suspect or suspect vehicle in another location. If this happens to you, don't hesitate to call us. You aren't bothering us and we are happy to follow up on any additional detail or leads you might have. We can't solve crimes without help from the community and we appreciate your willingness to help.

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


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NEIGHBORHOOD COMPOST BIN GIVEAWAY!

Remembering Lorna May (1937-2022)

"If you want to know anything about flowers or birds, just ask Lorna May," said Lori Thuli, who was moving out of the Leyton Lane house as my sister, Susan, and I moved into it, right next door to Lorna May Huebner.

Lorna May's front yard, a project of her husband Don, who passed away in 2018, was wild with paths, stones, and native plants, like Jack-in -the-Pulpits. Dutchman's breeches, cone flowers, columbines, and many threeleaved trillium. "One year," Lorna May told us, "they were re-doing Highway 14 to Sauk City. Word passed like wildfire that bulldozers were going to plow right through a field of trillium the next day. By the time Don and I drove there, there were cars all over, everyone digging up trillium."

Neighbor kids knew Lorna May's home because every holiday--Easter, Halloween, and Christmas-she dragged out giant, night-lit bunnies, jack-o-lanterns, and Santas, who otherwise vied for space in her garage. During the pandemic, Lorna May sat out on a chilly afternoon with neighbors, the Liljequists, to greet everyone on our COVID Walk-About. Kind neighbors escorted her to various luncheons, and she got as far as the front porch this winter and last to view the street-long display of ice lanterns. "I just love them," she told us. We lit a few extra.

Many on our block grew to admire Lorna May for her gracious acceptance of her age, her stories of early Arbor Hills, and her warm sense of humor. She was the sort of grandmother many of us would want, non-judgmental and delighted anytime her kids, grandkids, nieces or nephews visited, which was often. Her three children, Peter, Rachel, and Paul, have many childhood

memories of Arbor Hills, and they did not move far after marriage, so Lorna May's driveway was often full of cars on weekends. We envied that.

You are indeed lucky if your neighbor is older.

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
